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AREA BUDGET 2025/26: APPLICATIONS FOR FUNDING

Purpose of Report:

Introduction

1. This report provides details on the Area Partnership's budget position for 2025/26, any applications considered under Delegated Functions, and makes recommendations on further funding applications.

Background

- 2. Glasgow City Council agreed its budget for 2025/26 on 13th February 2025 with the overall funding available for Area Partnerships maintained at 2024/25 levels. The City Administration Committee approved allocations to Area Partnership on 13th March 2025. The Anderston/City/Yorkhill Area Budget for 2025/26 is £62,446.00.
- 3. The Area Partnership committed £2,430.00 from the 2025/26 Area Budget at its meeting on 13th February 2025 and £0 has been committed under the Scheme of Delegated Functions.
- 4. Therefore, a total of £2,432.00 has been committed to date to various projects serving the area, leaving a balance of £60,014.00 yet to be allocated.

Glasgow Marriage Counselling Services Project Title Building Healthy Relationships PRN: 033/25	Since 1947, Glasgow Marriage Counselling Services have been providing counselling services, and have been assisting families in Glasgow when their relationships are under stress, by giving people the tools to build healthier, stronger relationships, and increasing their resilience to deal with life's challenges. Glasgow Marriage Counselling Services are a quality assured & accredited service within the membership of the Relationships Scotland Network. Glasgow Marriage Counselling Services have developed a 'Building Healthy Relationships Learning and Development Manual', and they seek to now take this manual out into the community by offering 'first-aider' training in healthy relationships to community groups. This will give some understanding and tools to help people, partners and communities build healthy relationships. The organisation propose a pilot initiative from April to December 2025, in the Ward 10 area where they are based. The initiative has 2 pillars and 2 audiences: 1. To deliver Healthy Relationship learning and development to community groups within Anderston, City Centre, and Yorkhill, which supports community wellbeing and addresses the needs of vulnerable people, giving people understanding and skills to build resilience. They will explore the different cultures present within their own school community, and celebrate the diversity and traditions they are surrounded by. The results of these sessions will be displayed for families in a winter community showcase event. Children will also put together their own portfolios of work that will be used to achieve an Arts Award through Trinity College London. These awards will be publicly presented at the final community event and shared with the school to be listed award pupils individual achievements. The final community showcase event will also take place after school. PEEK anticipate around 90 people will be in attendance, including original participants and representatives from the school. In addition to displaying the art work created in sessions and the presentation of Arts Awards, PEEK will provide a sit down meal for families to eat together. In previous programmes at St Patricks, PEEK found that families sitting down and eating together has led to the formation of new friendships, not just between children but whole families. PEEK is committed to supporting vulnerable families in this community and their aim is to continue growing their presence, widening their reach, and helping more families thrive.

Project Title Empowering the Community: Glasgow Craft & Culture Collective PRN: 055/25	The ACVC HUB is a grassroots charity dedicated to nurturing mental health and wellbeing through the transformative power of traditional arts and crafts. They offer a safe space for the Armed Forces community and Glasgow community to find solace, inspiration, and camaraderie, as they engage in creative pursuits. ACVC HUB believe this project is needed, as it is essential to addressing social isolation, unemployment, and limited creative opportunities for both the armed forces community and local residents. The ACVC have a proved track record that arts and crafts reduce isolation, improves mental health, and builds resilience – with their current space seeing an average of 26 participants per day, but they lack an exhibition venue to showcase work and expand access to the wider community. Veterans transition to civilian life often struggle with unemployment and loss of purpose. Glasgow also has a thriving creative scene, yet there are limited affordable spaces for emerging artists and makers to showcase work, host exhibitions, or run workshops. The need for more inclusive, cross-community creative spaces has been highlighted through discussions with partners (local charities, veteran groups, and community groups). They are also seeking transport costs to ensure their members can access this event. This event will also include information stalls on their current mental health support, how to access their various support services, and also information about relevant partners and services in the area which may benefit members. This will be an opportunity for people to come together as a community. The LGBT asylum seeking community is particularly isolated as they face multiple disadvantages and barriers due to their identity and background. It can be hard to access support in mainstream refugee groups for fear of experiencing homophobia, biphobia, transphobia etc. and there are very few specialist services which meet their needs. They also face the same racism, isolation and discrimination other people seeking asylum do on a daily basis with access to less community support and resources. LGBT Unity are only able to run these events throughout the year where small local funds make this possible, and the entire organisation is volunteer led.
