Response by Executive Director of Education Services	Update as follows; In responding to the specific questions, it is important to confirm that the work shared here, is Education Services city wide strategic work, linked to Anti Racism. Participating pupils come from a range of Primary and Secondary schools from across Glasgow. Their establishments will have throughout the year, a range of their own activities and projects within their schools around the theme of Anti Racism and Equalities.
	The Anti Racism Conversations 15 Secondary schools - 45 pupils participating to date Secondary school pupils have had 2 sessions and a tour of city chambers. The secondary pupils explore and share their lived experiences, and global issues that can impact on equality.  20 Primary schools - 63 pupils participating to date Primary school pupils have had 1 session to date and a tour of city chambers. The primary session focussed on identity and values around

	With funding secured from the Turing Scheme, Education Services have launched the Voices Unite Project. The project will

offer international experiences for pupils and increased exposure to the world beyond their national borders. The project will allow pupils to explore, Anti Racism/Equalities in a global context and also learn about new cultures, expanding their world and improving their engagement and confidence, even further.

Voices Unite project has **6 Secondary schools and 30 pupils involved.** All pupils involved are from BME communities. The project will culminate with an international visit of all 30 pupils from Glasgow visiting our European partners in Grenoble (France) in May/ June 2025 in two separate cohorts. Each secondary school has five pupils in their group and secondary schools involved are-

Mission 3 – Continue to develop actions designed to prevent suicide and impact on shelf harm.

Can information be provided on what training options are available to staff?

## Response by Chief Officer, Glasgow Health and Social Care

The multi-agency Glasgow City Suicide Prevention Partnership has a broad range of membership and an active sub-group structure, including one specifically to consider the training agenda for HSCP, Glasgow City Council, and partner agencies. A Summary Action Plan to guide the Glasgow City suicide prevention work is being finalised and this could be circulated once available if this would be helpful.

An active training delivery programme is maintained within existing resources, through the use of existing staff from within the HSCP and external partners, supported by a training network. Training places are shared across the council and partner agencies.

Training courses are targeted at groups of staff, dependant on role, and include Suicide Talk, a brief awareness session, Safetalk and Applied Suicide Intervention Skills (ASIST), a formal 2-day programme to develop intervention skills. A programme of self-harm training called What's the Harm, delivered through partner agencies, is also available. Wave After Wave has recently been introduced to the suite of training, a new programme designed in partnership with Glasgow Association for Mental Health focused on bereavement by suicide.

In relation to self-harm training, there is ongoing discussions with Education Services to ensure that there is now an active pool of What's the Harm trainers to directly support the schools sector in the city. Partnership working also included the universities to reach the city's student population.

Data gathered through the Suicide Prevention Partnership highlights that 1333 staff have received suicide prevention training, across 81 sessions/courses.

## Response by Chief Officer, Glasgow Health and Social Care

Homelessness Services in collaboration with NRS, carry out health and safety visits to bed and breakfast accommodation to assess conditions and address any necessary actions or recommendations. These visits help identify concerns, and where required, staff work with hotel owners to implement appropriate support. All visits are recorded and documented.

- HSCP has no statuary authority over hotels this resides with, Health and Safety Executive, Strathclyde Fire and Rescue, Licensing board and NRS Environmental service Health and Safety inspections have been undertaken by NRS to 7 sites and all have adhered to any recommendations that NRS have put forward resulting in no enforcement orders, however HSCP have no direct responsibilities for enforcement
- HSCP has in place four weekly oversight accommodation meeting including Police Scotland and where necessary other stakeholders, consideration is given to safeguarding, Health and Safety, and complaints
- HSCP meet annually with hotels

There is currently a GDPR consideration in relation to providing any specific information on individual hotels.

There will be a series of events and activities at the Mitchell Library but, subject to funding, may extend to community libraries too. These are still being scoped but previous events to complement the LKN exhibitions have included screenings (live or recorded from the British Library in London), talks, workshops and children's activities. Current areas being explored are zine workshops, seed exchanges, PhD student talks and author events.

Many of the Saturday Glasgow 850 talks during the run of the exhibition will be on the theme of Glasgow's greenspaces/gardens.

This year's Summer Reading Challenge is linked to climate, which also gives an opportunity to create activities that will engage communities in the wider gardening theme. Community Libraries will be supplied with supporting information to encourage displays, activities and engagement across the city.

# Response by Head of Policy and Corporate Governance

The Strategic Plan is reviewed annually to ensure it is focused on the council's agreed Grand Challenges and that the council is responding to the opportunities and challenges citizens face.
