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1 Glasgow's International Education

- 1.1 Glasgow's International Education has been an integral part of Education Services, enhancing the provision of International Education across Glasgow establishments for several years. In December 2022 the service was refreshed to adapt to the evolving landscape in a post-Brexit and post-COVID context.
- 1.2 To provide greater direction to International Education work, we developed a strategic plan aligning all aspects of International Education. This plan consists of four Grand Challenges to reflect the City Business Plan and Education Services 'All Learners, All Achieving' document.
- 1.3 The Grand Challenges are designed to support establishments to recognise that International Education is not just about Youth Mobilities and opportunities for young people to travel. As a diverse and multicultural city, Glasgow must reflect the richness of our learners in our educational practices across all curriculum areas. The plan supports our schools to integrate a global perspective into their curriculum.

THE PROMISE OF EVERY CHILD

How do we support Glasgow's learners to receive the best possible education, recognising our role in reducing poverty and inequality in our communities?

CLIMATE ACTION

In what ways can we empower Glasgow's Learners to engage in fighting the Climate Emergency, both locally and globally?

FUTURE OF YOUTH MOBILITY

How can we enable our young people to broaden their perspectives, through supporting opportunities to study or experience other ways of living and working?

IDENTITY AND PARTICIPATION

How do we help ensure that our young people's full identities are welcomed and developed in Glasgow's diverse society? In what ways can we empower our young people to participate as active citizens of the world?

2 The Turing Scheme

- 2.1 The Turing Scheme was established in early 2021 as the UK government's initiative to support international education and training for students and learners following the UK exit from the European Union. Named after the influential mathematician and computer scientist Alan Turing, the scheme was created to replace the Erasmus+ program, which the UK was no longer part of after leaving the European Union.
- 2.2 The scheme aims to promote global educational opportunities, enabling students from UK institutions to participate in study and work placements abroad. It was designed to address the need for greater international collaboration and cultural exchange in education, ensuring that students can gain valuable experiences that enhance their employability and personal development.

- 2.3 The government allocated £110 million in its initial year to fund various educational settings, including universities, colleges, and schools. One of the key focuses of the Turing Scheme is inclusivity, providing support for underrepresented and disadvantaged groups to ensure equitable access to international opportunities.
- 2.4 The establishment of the Turing Scheme signifies the UK's commitment to fostering a global perspective in education and enhancing the skills of its workforce. By creating pathways for students to engage with international partners, the scheme aims to strengthen the UK's educational landscape and promote cultural understanding in a post-Brexit context.

3 Turing grant funding for Glasgow

- 3.1 For school session 2024/25 Education services have been allocated in £35,352.40 inTuring funding across 12 grants. This is a significant rise from the 2 grants allocated in the previous session 2023/24.
- 3.2 This funding will enable 8 primary schools, 7 secondary schools and 1 ASN school to take children on youth mobilities over the course of this school session. Almost all of the schools are visiting European countries and one is visiting Malawi. We are delighted that schools are continuing to forge links with Glasgow's Twin cities and Valencia, who Glasgow has a strong bond with.

3.4 The Turing funding supports the purchase of passports and any necessary visas for young people travelling abroad. Additionally, it covers clothing and other trip-specific items to ensure that no young person faces disadvantages due to their socio-economic background. This support not only provides immediate benefits but also equips young people with essential travel documents that can be advantageous for their future. Consequently, the Turing funding establishes a lasting legacy in the lives of our young people.

4 International Education development work

4.1 In addition to providing comprehensive support and professional development for schools across the city, International Education facilitates a variety of educational visits to Glasgow. Since August 2024 we have successfully hosted a range of visits.

- 4.3 Evaluations of these visits have been overwhelmingly positive with feedback from both visitors and host establishments highlighting the value of these experiences. Many establishments expressed a desire to maintain the link between themselves and their visitors and that they would be keen to welcome future groups. All participants acknowledge the significant learning opportunities that arise from International Education experiences of this nature.
- 4.4 International Education have also been supporting the Lord Provost's Postcard Project as part of Glasgow's 850 birthday celebrations. We currently have 30 primary schools signed up to take part in this project. Many schools requesting partners which will support us to further strengthen our Twin City partnerships and further develop our learner's knowledge of Glasgow's Twin Cities.
- 4.5 As part of our International Education work, we also represent the authority as the Vice-Chair of the Eurocities Children and Young people working group. Glasgow has hosted a working group face to face meeting in Glasgow and presented at the working group coffee chat professional development monthly sessions. This enhances our work around challenging child poverty by looking outwards and fostering collaboration with our European counterparts.
