

Glasgow City Health and Social Care Partnership - Update noted.

9 There was submitted a report by the Chief Officer, Glasgow City Health and Social Care Partnership (GCHSCP), advising of an update on health improvement within the Ward, advising that

- (1) on the 1st January 2026 GCHSCP introduced a dedicated Huntington's Disease (HD) pathway, existing patients, new patients, and their families residing in Glasgow City who are affected by HD will receive a coordinated, specialist led support, whilst also benefiting from integration across the wider health and social care services available within the partnership. - (2) the Glasgow's safer drug consumption facility, known as the Thistle, marked its first year in operation on the 13th January 2026 and that the facility had been accessed 11,348 times by 575 people (448 male and 127 female) who had so far registered to use the service;
- (3) the Scottish Government and COSLA had launched the new 2026 to 2029 action plan for [Creating Hope Together](#) and that the new plan had set out Scotland's continued commitment to reducing suicide, improving support for people and communities affected by suicide;
- (4) the GCHSCP funds mental health provision was quickly and easily accessible to a range of children and young people dependent on their needs and could be accessed at [Children and Young People's Mental Health Support Guide \(Glasgow City\) - NHSGGC](#) to mental health supports and services for children and young people in Glasgow;
- (5) GCHSCP's Community Respiratory Team (CRT) is a multidisciplinary team of 20 staff, including physiotherapists, respiratory nurse specialists, occupational therapist, pharmacist, support workers and business support that respond when someone has a flare up of COPD and aimed to prevent avoidable hospital admissions by providing timely care in the community; and
- (6) that NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde had partnered with Glasgow City Football Club to encourage more 25–29year-olds to attend their cervical screening appointment as less than half of this age group take the test.
