Violent Crime

The table below provides a breakdown of non-sexual crimes of violence.

Murder has noted an increase from PYTD, and 5-year mean with 6 murders recorded this year, 4 PYTD and a 5-year mean of 3.2. Detection rate for murder has increased 25% from PYTD with the current detection rate being 100%.

Culpable homicides have noted increases compared to PYTD and 5-year mean. The detection rate for these offences is currently 100%.

Attempted murders have noted decreases of 26% compared to 5-year mean, but an increase of 10% from PYTD. Attempted murder detection rates are also currently sitting at 100%.

Serious assault has noted a decrease from PYTD and 5-year mean. Serious assault detection rates have remained almost static from PYTD with a current detection rate of 67.5%.

Common assault has noted a 7.26% increase from PYTD and 16.7% from 5-year mean. Detection rates have noted a slight increase of 2.4%.

Robbery has seen a very slight increase of 3.66% from PYTD and 5.2% from 5-year mean. Robbery detection rates are 75.3%.

Violence Against Women and Girls

The table below outlines crimes usually associated with Violence against Women and Girls.

Domestic abuse of females has noted a 32.56% increase compared to PYTD and 31.34% increase from the 5-year mean. Detection rates for domestic abuse have noted 13.30% increase from PYTD with the current detection rate being 80.07%.

Rape has noted 46.25% increase compared to PYTD, and an increase of 44% from 5-year mean. This increase is reflective of 23/24 figures which also noted increases in reporting. Attempted Rape has noted a 25% reduction from PYTD, but a 36.36% increase from 5-year mean. Detection rates for rape and attempted rape have noted significant increases of 36.01% and 54.2%, respectively from PYTD.

Sexual assault has noted a 24.6% increase from PYTD, and 43.65% from 5- year mean. Detection rates have decreased slightly by 6.5%.

Reporting of sexual crime continues to rise and it is important to note that these figures relate to recorded crimes not the number victims, with many victims reporting more than offence. Robust governance is in place with rape cases being reviewed. Preventative inputs and initiatives are ongoing with partners as part of our VAWG strategy and we continue to work closely with our partners to support victims and families affected by domestic abuse and sexual crime.

Hate Crime

Hate incidents remained the same as PYTD with 55 incidents recorded but increased by 50.30% from the 5-year mean of 36.6 incidents.

Hate crime increased by 69.7% from PYTD, and 49% from 5-year mean, with 628 crimes this year, 370 crimes PYTD and a 5-year mean of 421.4.

Hate crime detections rates have increased from PYTD and 5-year mean.

Appendix C- Community Wellbeing

Community Events

Summer Safety Campaign

Police Scotland Youth Volunteers (PSYV) assisted national charity Fearless to create and promote the Fearless/Scot Rail Summer Safety Campaign. This was a national campaign aimed at highlighting the importance of personal safety and pro-social behaviour.

Bangla Centre

Officers from Greater Glasgow Partnerships attended the opening of the Bangla Centre's new premises in the Springburn area along with other agencies and councillors. Officers heard from different members of the Bangladeshi community about their origins in Glasgow. The centre hopes that it will be used by all those in the Springburn area and become a hub for the local community. Officers offered to support the group and community through doing inputs and engagement with the local community policing teams, which the group welcomed.

I AM ME Training

I AM ME Keep Safe training has been delivered to staff within Northwest Women's Centre in Maryhill. The input aimed to promote the reporting of disability hate crime as well as highlight the role of Keep Safe places within our community.

Crime Prevention

Shut out Scammers Campaign

The 'Scam Van' along with officers from Police Scotland and Trading Standards provided crime prevention advice across the division. The engagement event was to raise awareness of doorstep and cyber scams with the aim of empowering the public to disengage with any criminals and encourage reporting. The Scam Van activity was also documented on social media platforms.

PSYV Crime Prevention Advice

G Division PSYV continue to work alongside Community officers across the division in an effort to provide crime prevention advice to local residents. Information regarding vehicle crime, property safety and anti-social behaviour have been shared to residents in the east of the city in conjunction with the Community Alcohol Partnership highlighting offences regarding the proxy purchase of alcohol.

Protecting Vulnerable People

Officers from G Division Safer Communities Equality and Diversity Team have continued to attend at the GO Urban- initial accommodation for Asylum seekers to deliver presentations on Scots Law and provide personal safety advice. Officers have also extended advice to neighbouring divisions.

In partnership with Scottish Fire and Rescue service, G Division Partnerships Officers delivered a lived experience input with children's houses around the impact of becoming involved in violent crime. The input was delivered at the Calton fire station with a group of young people who had been identified as being vulnerable to engaging in violent crime. Lived experience presenter spoke about the impact of crime on him, his family and the wider community.

Greater Glasgow partnerships continue to roll out the neighbourhood alert system provided by Neighbourhood Watch Scotland, having trained several officers in its use. This platform allows direct messaging of crime prevention advice to users of the service. A total of 2730 email alerts have been sent out via the system.
