

Police Scotland - Local Policing Plan 2023-26 – Performance for Year 2, Quarter 1 noted – Request to Police Scotland.

3 There was submitted a report by Chief Superintendent Lynn Ratcliff, Police Scotland, providing an overview of the current performance of Police Scotland during the Quarter1 period from 1st April to 30th June 2024, advising

- (1) of the continued drive forward with its Public Health Approach to policing that involved working closely with partners to support vulnerable members of the community;
- (2) that there had been a slight increase in overall violent crimes and detection rates compared to the previous year, with Police Scotland committed to working towards reducing those figures;
- (3) that hate crime detection rates had slightly increased compared to the previous year, with Police Scotland continuing to work with its partners to report all hate crimes via the appropriate channels;
- (4) of some of the work being undertaken in relation to crime, homicides in the city, police impersonator fraud, events, operations and serious and organised crime; and
- (5) of a detailed breakdown of the complaints against police, violent crime, violence against women and girls, hate crime and community wellbeing, as detailed in the appendices to the report.

After consideration, the Partnership

- (a) noted the report;
- (b) requested that Chief Superintendent Lynn Radcliff
 - (i) look into whether Police Scotland or other partners were working with bus and taxi drivers in the city on road safety awareness and report back to a future meeting with this information;
 - (ii) incorporate into its report a statistical breakdown of reported taser use incidents; and
 - (iii) bring back to a future meeting, an update on the body worn camera roll-out for Police Officers due to commence in Spring 2025; and
- (c) thanked Police Scotland regarding its assistance and work undertaken to advise and re-assure the public with regards to the recent protests and unrest in England which had understandably caused anxiety to communities in Glasgow due to speculation of protests taking place in the city.
