## Development of Climate Impact Assessment Tool

## 1.0 Background

- 1.1 The Climate Change (Duties of Public Bodies: Reporting Requirements) (Scotland) Amendment Order 2020 was updated in 2022 to require that public bodies include in their annual climate change reports “how the body will align its spending plans and use of resources with emissions targets”
- 1.2 Audit Scotland wrote to all public bodies in March 2022 to confirm their expectation that public bodies ensure all future funding and investment decisions are based on their contribution to climate change ambitions.
- 1.3 In 2019, Glasgow City Council acknowledged the scale of the global climate challenge by declaring a Climate and Ecological Emergency. The city then published its [Climate Plan in 2021](#) setting out key action required to achieve our vision and targets for 2030.
- 1.4 A key plank of this approach is the development of a Climate Change Impact Assessment (CCIA) Tool; and associated training programme. This committee was updated in [February 2023](#) on the anticipated approach and framework; and again in [January 2024](#) where a commitment was given to return to Committee when the tool was more fully developed..
- 1.5 Work has been ongoing through 2024 to develop an appropriate decision tool that can assist in ensuring decisions and their Climate Impacts are understood clearly and concisely.
- 1.6 The initial timescale of early 2024 has been necessarily delayed in order reflect the outcomes of the [EQIA process audit and Guidance refresh](#) (reported to this Committee in Oct 23) as the CCIA process requires to dovetail into EQIA; and to reflect the work of the Thriving Cities initiative, and in particular the [City Portrait framework](#).
- 1.7 It should be noted that papers for the [Net Zero Carbon in May 2024](#) have been impact assessed using the draft tool.
- 1.8 This report seeks to present the draft Climate Change Impact Assessment for noting and for comment (Appendix 1). All comments will be reflected in the ongoing refinement of the tool.

## 2.0 Climate Change Impact: Assessment: Approach

- 2.1 The complexity of Climate Change is a challenge in developing a tool that is both comprehensible and accessible to services; while addressing the key areas of Climate focus. The challenge as with existing Equality Impact methodologies is to allow services to be able to understand the complexity but have an accessible toolkit that allows the burden of ecological impact to be clearly understood.

### 3.0 Climate Change Impact Assessment: Framework of Assessment

3.1 The CCIA screening will look at 5 key areas:

1. **Identify the Policy, Project, Service Reform or Budget Option to be assessed**

A clear definition of what is being screened and its aims

2. **Check that the decision is consistent with Council Strategic Goals and wider strategic goals**

Looking at the 4 Strategic lenses; Council Strategic Plan; the Climate plan and the UN Sustainable Development Goals and the City Portrait

3. **Using the 5 key Evidence Filters**

Looking at Energy, Transport, Built Environment, Biodiversity and Just Transition as way of gathering evidence and determining outcomes

➤ **Gathering Evidence & Stakeholder Engagement**

Collect data to evidence the type of barriers people face to accessing services (research, consultations, complaints and/or consult with equality groups)

➤ **Determine outcome of Assessment & Differential Impacts**

Reaching an informed decision using the 5 evidence filters on whether or not there is a differential impact on Climate, and at what level

4. **Outcomes, Assessment Ranking (?), Action & Public Reporting**

Develop an action plan to make changes where a negative impact has been assessed. Ensure that both the assessment outcomes and the actions taken to address negative impacts are publicly reported. Ranking of Assessment level.

5. **Monitoring, Evaluation & Review**

Stating how you will monitor and evaluate the **Policy, Project, Service Reform or Budget Option** to ensure that you are continuing to achieve the expected outcomes for all groups.

3.2 The CCIA's key output is a structured report using **four strategic lenses** to determine the strategic outcome focus of the decision being considered, and if it strategically consistent with the following:

3.3 These lenses help us understand how and where the burden of impact can be understood across our **five key evidence filters**:

1. **Energy**
2. **Transport**
3. **Built and Natural Environment**
4. **Just Transition**
5. **Biodiversity**

These filters then lead to a position; where the evidence gathered can suggest areas to calculate **Carbon Impacts**

#### **4.0 Climate Change Impact Assessment: Next Steps and Scrutiny Approach**

- 4.1 The Roll out of training and CCIA process to wider city council staff, can commence later in 2024, with prioritisation for Elected Members on key Committees.
- 4.2 The CCIA training will be aligned with future Climate Literacy Training provision to Elected members and timescales for the roll out will be defined as the initial training for the CCIA is reviewed.
- 4.3 This Committee will be updated as required about the process and methodology; and how the Climate Change Impact Assessment will be deployed; and it's impacts on future reports to OPDSC. The Committee will also have an opportunity to consider the updated Climate Change Impact Assessment Guidance when for the end of 2024.
