Carried forward from meeting held on 10th April 2024 - Item 2 – Local Government Benchmarking Framework	Bailie Wardrop - Homecare costs for Glasgow indicate they are at higher levels than other authorities. Could an explanation/analysis be provided on these costs?	
Answer	The homecare costs included in the Local Benchmark Return prepared by Improvement Service do not accurately reflect the average costs for homecare in Glasgow. This is because of the methodology adopted by the Improvement Service to calculate these figures. Costs are taken from the Local Financial Returns which capture the costs of homecare for ALL service users. However, the hours used to calculate the average are based on a separate national statistical return which identifies the hours ONLY for those service users who are over the age of 65, although we gather some modelling has also taken place with the latter. As a result, the Costs per Hour have been over-inflated. Although we do not believe the modelling of the Hours Provided has materially affected the calculation, we would also like to understand how this has been done. Adjusting the cost figure to only include the cost of delivering the service for over 65's brings the Home Care cost per hour to £30.96 for Glasgow (2022/23). This is close to the Scottish average (£30.45) and is considerably lower than the figure of £42.57 quoted by the Improvement Service for Glasgow.	Margaret Hogg/ Duncan Black

Answer	1 – In its 2021/22 budget GCC allocated £200,000 to Food Growing advising that the budget allocation was aimed at: 'Investment to support delivery of the city's Food Growing Strategy (FGS), lowering emissions and increasing access to healthy, nutritional, local food, including in schools.', to which additional sums have been added through funding bids to Vacant and Derelict Land Fund, Developer contributions, Local Parks and Open Spaces Improvement Fund, Sighthill TRA and other sources. In addition in its 2022/23 budget GCC allocated a further £200,000 to Food Growing as part of a wider Climate Action Fund, with this being made available to community growers via the Lets Grow Together fund, further details below. 2 –The £56k grant funding from the Lets Grow Together Fund, will be used by communities to provide growing spaces over and above the additional 99 plots detailed in the report. Funding for the additional 99 plots has already been secured.	NRS
