Answer	The Council works with its partner local authorities in Glasgow City Region on the innovation agenda and the UK Government funded Innovation Accelerator programme was directed to the city-region both in recognition of this work and to support it. Further activity has led to the development of a Regional Innovation Action Plan, which can be accessed <a href="here">here</a> , and which was co-created with Scottish Enterprise and Innovate UK. Two of the city-region's three Innovation Districts are in Glasgow City, with the third being the Advanced Manufacturing Innovation District Scotland ( <a href="mailto:AMIDS">AMIDS</a> ), located in the Renfrewshire Council area by Glasgow Airport. Glasgow City Region also works closely with its two peer Combined Authority partners in Greater Manchester and West Midlands on the Innovation Accelerator programme and related policy, with further details across the three regions available at the link <a href="mailto:here">here</a> .	
Item 4	Open Space Strategy action programme update  Councillor Bolander:  Can further detail be provided on what the 2 quality standards are?	NRS
Answer	1.1 The Council's Open Space Strategy (OSS) sets out the Council's approach to the use of open space and how to plan for it. A central focus of the OSS is on the use of Open Space standards to inform the council's understanding of how and where publicly usable open space needs to be provided and/or enhanced. The OSS sets out Accessibility and Quality Standards, with a view to making sure householders have local access to a good quality, multifunctional open space, attractive to all members of the community. It also sets out a Quantity Standard (with a view to making sure there is a sufficient quantity of publicly usable open space in that part of the City). Quality Assessments look at size, configuration, provision for the needs of different groups and also maintenance and condition.	

- 1.2 However, the Open Space Standards do not apply in the City Centre. Instead, the OSS takes a different approach to planning and delivering publicly usable open space and public realm in the City Centre, which recognises the detailed work and public engagement which has taken place to bring forward the City Centre District Regeneration Frameworks and the work that has informed the City Centre Strategic Development Framework. These documents set out how the open space and public realm needs of the City Centre should be met and form the basis for planning for open space enhancement/creation in the City Centre.
- 1.3 These approaches to the provision/enhancement of open space have been incorporated into the Supplementary Guidance SG6; Green Belt and Green Network to form the basis of the Council's planning policy approach to developer contributions for public open space.
- 2 City Centre Priorities
- 2.1 The City Centre Strategic Development Framework and the District Regeneration Frameworks emphasise:
- Greening the city centre
- Creating high-quality public spaces
- Supporting health, wellbeing, and climate resilience
- Prioritising areas like George Square, Buchanan Street, Blythswood Hill, and the Riverside for enhancement

Developer contributions collected under SG6 in the City Centre are directed toward delivering these strategic goals and on identified opportunities for open space or public realm creation or enhancement, with contributions towards food growing and outdoor sports also expected from residential developments throughout the city centre.
