Annual Procurement Report FY25/26

1 Background

- 1.1 As required under section 18 of the Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014 (the Act), a contracting authority (which includes local authorities) must produce an Annual Procurement Report which monitors the authority's regulated procurement activities against delivery of its Procurement Strategy. The report must be completed as soon as reasonably practicable after the end of its financial year. A regulated procurement is defined as any procurement above £50,000 for goods and services or £2,000,000 for works.
- 1.2 The content of the Annual Procurement Report reflects the requirements of the Act which details the information that is required to be reported on, namely:
- A summary of all regulated procurements completed during the year
 - A review of whether those procurements complied with the authority's Procurement Strategy
 - A summary on how the authority prioritise and take account of climate change and circular economy via procurement activities
 - Where any procurements did not comply, a statement of how the authority intends to ensure future regulated procurements do comply
 - A summary of community benefits that were fulfilled during the year
 - A summary of any steps taken to facilitate involvement of supported businesses and social enterprises
 - A summary of regulated procurements which the authority expects to commence in the next 18 months

2 The Annual Procurement Report

- 2.1 The content of the council's Annual Procurement Report for FY25/26 covers all the above information during the period 1 April 2025 to 31 March 2026 and details how these procurements supported the aims and objectives of the council's Sustainable Procurement Strategy 2023-2027 .
