Local Fire and Rescue Service Plan Priorities

The Local Fire and Rescue Service Plan has been developed to set out the priorities and objectives within North East Glasgow and allows our local authority partners to scrutinise the performance outcomes of these priorities. We will continue to work closely with our partners in North East Glasgow to ensure we are all “**Working Together for a Safer Scotland**” through targeting risks to our communities at a local level.

The plan has been developed to complement key partnership activity embedded across the Glasgow Community Plan and associated Delivery and Thematic plans. Through partnership working we will seek to deliver continuous improvement in our performance and effective service delivery in our area of operations.

The Local Fire and Rescue Plan for Glasgow identified six areas for demand reduction and is subject to regular monitoring and reporting through the Police / Fire and Rescue Committee. A summary of the priorities and current activity is detailed below with further detail and analysis contained within this performance report.




Activity by Time of Day






Accidental Dwelling Fires Activity by Ward (% share)








Accidental Dwelling Fire Casualties by Ward (% share)




Fire Casualties by Time of Day








Non-Fire Casualties by Ward (% share)




Non-Fire Casualties by Time of Day










Deliberate Fires by Ward (% share)




Deliberate Fires by Time of Day






Primary Fire Ratio by Activity Type



Secondary Fire Ratio by Activity Type





Deliberate Fires Compared to Operational Activity










Non-Domestic Fires by Nature of Origin












Unwanted Fire Alarm Signals - Top 5 Premises

The consultation on the next Fire and Rescue Framework for Scotland is available online through the Scottish Government's website until 22nd December, and I would like to encourage you to participate in this consultation exercise.

The consultation invites your views on the proposed Framework and its strategic key priorities. The Fire and Rescue Framework for Scotland is the vehicle through which Scottish Ministers set out priorities and objectives that the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS) must have regard to in carrying out its functions, in terms of public safety, efficiency and effectiveness.

The 7 strategic priorities within the proposed new Framework set out Scottish Ministers' expectations of SFRS and also seek to provide guidance and support to the Service, setting in context the overarching purpose that SFRS should adhere to in carrying out its functions.
